

The Highly Anticipated Grand Egyptian Museum To Open This Year When it opens, the \$1 billion mega-structure will display 50,000 artifacts, with thousands more in rotation.

The vast 5.2-million-square-foot museum will house more than 100,000 objects, including 30,000 that have never been exhibited before. Highlighted will be the entire 5,000-piece funerary collection of King Tutankhamun, including his sandals, chariot, and cheetah-skin shield – the first time in history that the full collection will be on display.

The Antarctic peninsula is a mountainous area where one will see icebergs, glaciers and a great amount and variety of wildlife. It is the most scenic of all Antarctic regions, making it a photographer's paradise.
